



At 6.55 p.m. on Feb:I6th
fracture of the wrist SR 86 reported the accident to me immediately and asked for the car to send him straight to hospital. I telephoned Dr. and was teld to send to his surgery, that he would be there until 7.30. I teld Sr.A. to have him down at the surgery at 7.15 if possible.

The previous day ad fallen on a haystile and got a thorn in his hand. It was poulticed for 24 hrs, but there was some inflammatic and he, too, was sent to the Dr. lid not wait to wash him or change his clothing. The car with the two boys left the house at 7. II. Dr. saw them and sent them to the City Hospital Our driver was to stay with them saw them and sent them to the City Hospital. Our driver was to stay with them and bring them home, but the Dr.in the O.P. Dept. sent him back here for a written permission to adminster an anaesthetic. When this was being written the driver went to get his overcoat as he had been rushed out without it the first time. As he was about to leave for the hospital Dr. telephoned and asked me to go to the hospital. SR 86 and I went at once in the car. We went to the O.P.dept and Dr. seme signed to us to go out with him to the corridor. He asked if I were Rev. Mother and went on to stay that ad told him a very strange story and if it got to the authorities it would go to the extreme limit, and that he wanted to shield us, and he would if we told him the truth. I asked what was the story and he replied that the boy had told him that the accident had happened the night before, and when he asked why he did not go first thing in the morning to have it seen to he said that he had to work all day. I told Dr. that the accident had happened that evening less than two hours before and I asked SR 86 to tell him what happened she did so and again he asked us to tell the truth and that he would shield us. I repeated that we were telling the truth and had nothing to hide. We left him and went into the room to the boys.Dr came in after us and in his presence I asked when did the accident happen and he said tonight.

The spoke to the boy and he said that he had hurt his arm that night. asked me again to tell the truth and that even if we did not own up the Xray would reveal the truth, that he would have to get a surgeon. to attend to the boy's arm and that if this story got out it would go to the extreme limit and that he as a catholic wanted to shield us.I replied. that there was nothing to hide from any surgeon and that surely an accident could happen at Termonbacca as well as at the City and County Hospital Dr. did not accept the written permission we had with us he asked the nurse who was present to get a hospital form which I signed. He told us that he was keeping the boys in the hospital. I asked to give me the names of the boys who were in the dormitory when he fell. We left the hospital and when we came in we questioned the three boys about the accident. One boy said that when SR 86 left the dormitory began to play and got up in his bed and tried to walk along the top rail and fell off on his arm. Theother boys said they did not see him fall, but they heard himscream and they ran to tell Sister that he was huet. had had a slight fracture of the samewrist at Christmas and had been attended to at the hospital.

I had already heard of this case via Co. Derry Welfare Authority, earlier this week.

The Home concerned is St. Joseph's Boys' Home, Termonbacca, run by the Nazareth Order. I understand that two boys were placed out to work on a farm in the Feeny-Dungiven area, from which two sons of the house had been "lifted" by the Police as internees or detainees.

Voluntary Homes are required under sec. 103 of the C. and Y.P. Act, 1950, to inform the Welfare Authority in whose area a child over school age proposes to reside on leaving the Home and the Welfare Authority is required to advise and befriend the child unless satisfied that the Home has its own after-care facilities. For children of school age and under, the Child Life Protection provisions in Part I of the Act would apply. For children over school age, prior approval to the placement is not required.

Homes have of course been made aware of these provisions, but it is the kind of thing that tends to lapse when management of a Home changes. It might be possible to issue a further circular letter on the subject to Voluntary Homes as was done on 16.3.51 in Circ. No. T.C.7.

Miss Wright will be visiting this Home in the near future and could be asked to take up the question of sec. 103 notification with them and in particular the placement of these two boys.
