Personal Details

1. I was born on My mother was from a small town called in County Tyrone. She worked in the canteen at the My mother was about forty years old when she got pregnant but she was not married. I was born in Downe Hospital in Downpatrick. I was placed as soon as I was born in the baby wing of Nazareth Lodge, Belfast. I think it was called St Joseph's. My mother came to see me all the time when I was in the home.

Nazareth Lodge (May 1963 – 29 August 1974)

2. As I got older I was moved to NL 5 group at Nazareth Lodge. I had been in another group before that. I cannot recall the name of that group but I remember being content up until I was moved to NL 5 group when I was about five or six years old. SR 34 was the nun in charge of this group and NL 5 was a civilian employee. NL 5 was extremely strict.

- 3. SR 34 was also the principal of the primary school in Nazareth Lodge. She was good to me most of the time and took me under her wing in a way. She put me in charge of the tuck shop which was like a red flag to a bull as I started to steal the sweets. One day SR 34 called me into a room and asked if I had stolen anything. I denied any theft and she said she would give me one more chance to tell the truth but I denied it and then she made me empty out the sweets from my pockets. She gave me a really bad beating that day because I had let her down. I ended up crawling under the table and she was grabbing me out from underneath the table. She lost it completely and she was kicking me with her feet and boots and hitting me with her hands. I was about seven or eight at the time and I felt really bad about this incident.
- 4. On another occasion I was supposed to be an altar boy when someone was visiting the home but I stayed outside and played football. When I eventually came in NL 5 took me into a small room and gave me a serious beating which I remember to this day. She had slapped me before this incident but never with the same severity. She beat me with her hands and kicked me with her feet. I was about eight or nine years old at the time. I am still not great with authority even now.
- 5. On another occasion after school I was playing in the old school dining room. The school was part of the home. Although it was in a different building it was part of the same complex. The school was separate from the home but the dining facilities were in the home and the nuns bedrooms were in the same building, all on ground floor level. We were taking off the rubber ends that were used to keep chairs from scraping the floor and we started playing football with them, making noise and throwing them around. I cannot remember which one caught us but either SR 34 or NL 5 came in and grabbed me and took me into her bedroom and gave me another beating which lasted between five and ten minutes and which I considered to be a bit excessive. I no longer recall the nature of my injuries nor do I recall receiving any medical treatment following this incident.


6.	On another occasion NL 5 was making the bed and I think we were
	messing about and when she turned her back someone just pulled my sheet
	out a bit as a prank. She came back and saw what had happened and she
	slapped me with her hand again. NL 4 was her side kick and she
	came in and she started to beat me as well. I had not had any problems with
	NL 4 prior to this incident. I think I was between eight and ten
	years old at the time. I remember NL 5 was called outside at the
	time and came back in to tell NL 4 that her father had died. I recall
	thinking that was her punishment for having hit me. I did not see much of
	NL 4 after that incident. She was another civilian employee.

- 7. We were definitely in the strictest group. We were always put to bed long before everyone else and in the summer you could hear them all out playing and we would be lying in bed from about 6pm in the evening, bright as a bell. It was bad in winter as well because NL 5 would wake you up before the end of her shift and line you up outside the bedroom in the hallway to make sure everyone went to the toilet. The toilets were straight across the hallway. She lined up everyone in the dormitory every night and there were about twelve or thirteen of us in one dormitory. You were left standing there in the freezing cold in a t-shirt or vest and a pair of pants in the middle of winter.
- 8. NL 5 did not like you drooling on the sheets. She would put a towel under you to protect the pillow but if it went through the towel and onto the pristine clean white pillow cases there was hell to pay for it. You would wake up every morning and check everything. At times NL 5 would stand you up and just come behind you and pull at your underwear and check them to make sure there were no marks or anything on the back of them which was humiliating.
- 9. When I was in NL 5 group we were always up early and we had our chores to do before mass and then we went to school. I had to clean the floor before breakfast with cloths attached to my feet. I think I left that group when I was about eleven years old.

- 10. I had no complaints about the food in the home.
- 11.I went to school in the grounds. I do not recall having any problems at primary school.
- 12. My mother would visit about once a month and I would spend an hour or an hour and a half with her. We would usually just sit and talk to each other in the staff room but I remember a couple of times we went out to the park.

 NL 5 would sometimes threaten that if I did not do something she asked she would ring my mother and not let her come to visit me. She would play those sorts of mind games with you. I never told my mother about being beaten in the home because you were too afraid to tell anyone.
- 13.1 stayed in the Lodge until I was eleven and then I went to Rubane House, Kircubbin.

19. During the holiday period at Nazareth Lodge we used to go to Ballyhorn	nan
every summer for a few weeks and then when we were in Rubane House	we

	refused initially he rang to advise that he had found a place on the course for
	me. I had a brilliant life after that. I studied at college for two years, worked in
	Hotels and then I moved to and worked in
	for about twenty years.
	About four years ago I took a stroke so I had to come back home because
	there are better facilities at home. I can no longer work as it is too risky for
	me in my current condition to work in a kitchen.
23	My mother died about eleven or twelve years ago and I went to the funeral but
	I did not know any of her family or relatives. I lost their contact numbers and
	never kept in contact with any of them.

24.	I don't know anything about my father. I never met him and my mother never
	told me about him.
25.	I never married but I had a daughter with a girl when I was about twenty three
ij	or twenty four. We tried to make it work between us but it didn't work out so I
9	went to work but I kept in contact with my daughter
8	to bring her over to in the summers for a few weeks and I saved up all
9	year to give her money at Christmas. She has turned out really well and she

has three children so I am a grandfather. She lives nearby so I see her and my grandchildren every day. Things have worked out well.

- 26. Being in an institution is the only life I had so it's the only life I knew. Everything has to be a laugh with me just to cover up my shyness. I think it's just a veil really so I can hide the insecurities I feel. When I was younger I would never talk about the home. I used to be embarrassed to say I was in a home. I recall we went on a course when I started college and they wanted the class to get to know one another by telling a little about themselves but I said I had nothing to tell. The course tutor told the class about my background when I was not present and when I found out that he had told them I cracked up with him. In my view it was not up to him to tell them such personal information about my background. I wouldn't tell people until I really got to know them well but the more I started talking about it and telling people the easier it was to talk about it.
- 27. Some of the stuff that went on in the homes was not right. I don't think it is as bad now. It might have been the times as well. The early 1960's and the 1970's were just harder generations but definitely it should never have happened to the extent that some of it did. As you get older you do get a bit more mature and you do think of it differently. You think it was your life, there's nothing you can do about it, it's been done, it is now done and dusted.

NL 5 I worked with a different group from and it would be unusual for 39. me to be working alongside or close to her in the morning time. I believe I was living for most of the period between 1971 and 1973 but, I accept I and working in was working in Nazareth Lodge when my mother died in 1974. which is dated 18th SR 47 This is confirmed in the reference from November 1975. I believe I obtained this reference before going to work in HIA 104 made a statement to the police about this alleged incident on 25th 40. November 2010 but he described it in a slightly different way. In his police account he alleged I was the person assaulting him in the dormitory when in the middle of this NL 5 came into the room and told me something which resulted in me leaving the room in tears. He alleges he later found out that I had been told that my mother had died whereas in his statement to the HIA Inquiry, he claims I had been told it was my father who had died. I do not recall HIA 104 I have no recollection of hitting him. I have a 41. SR 34 who told me that my mother had died. My mother clear memory that it was My recollection is she died on a Tuesday night and I was told this first thing the following morning by SR 34 My brother had come up to Nazareth Lodge to tell me and as soon as I heard I went straight home with my brother. NL 5 I cannot think the nuns would have told first of all and then asked her to tell me. I therefore believe the allegation made by HIA 104 possibly be true.
